Board of Trustees February Update

On January 4th, the Board of Trustees met for their monthly session. Here is information on committees, and issues not discussed elsewhere in our newsletter.



The Worship and Music Committee (WAM) needs our love and attention. As this committee's chairperson has recently stepped down, WAM is understaffed. If you can't commit to being a member please do reach out to Karen Churchill to sign up to help at an upcoming service. The jobs of chalice lighter, usher and reader need to be filled each week.

The Community Space Team met last month with our Treasurer, Jack Gomez to develop a recommended budget to include ongoing maintenance for the building. The team expects to hold open meetings this month and a congregation information meeting sometime soon.

The Finance Committee has been asked to recommend the funding for a renewal of the lease at 14 Main St. The landlord at 14 Main has recently sent notice that they would like us to renew and will only be increasing the rent a very nominal amount. A congregational vote will be required and is expected to be held in late February or early March in order to approve a lease renewal. As this transitional space has served our needs so well the past year, the Finance Committee and the Board are both recommending a renewal of this space.

Website Project Approved. The BOT has contracted with KLSutton Design to design a new website for Old Ship. The project is expected to begin this month and continue through the winter. Anyone interested in helping with this project should contact <u>Trish McAleer</u>.

Emeritus Status for Rev. Ken. The Board has received a request to consider offering our previous Minister Ken Read-Brown Emeritus status. Board members unanimously agreed that this would be fitting and beneficial for Old Ship. More research is needed into this process and it was agreed that this topic would be revisited in the February BOT meeting.

All Church Read: How are Climate Change and White Supremacy Culture Connected? Join us for the Discussion at 7 p.m. on Sunday, February 4 on Zoom — We are asking the congregation to engage in an "all church" read of a book that connects these two issues that we have been focusing on as part of our social justice work. The book is Climate Change is Racist: Race, Privilege and the Struggle for Climate Justice by Jeremy Williams. The author argues that climate change "is structurally racist, disproportionately caused by majority White people in majority White countries, with the damage unleashed overwhelmingly on people of colour." This is a short, 163 page book and our hope is that many of you will read it and then gather with us on Sunday, February 4 from 7-8:30 p.m. on Zoom to talk about it. Currently, the organization is working to help those refugees and immigrants coming to the greater Boston area from many places in the world. Services provided include humanitarian relief, English language learning, employment, skills training, and immigration legal services. We collected a total of \$4,026.79 for our fall recipients. The Hingham Food Pantry received \$910.79. We received donations of \$1513.18 for the Friends of the Homeless of the South Shore and after paying for the expenses of the holiday dinner for the Friends, we sent them a check for \$948.60. The total amount collected for the UUSC's Guest at Your Table Program, including donations made directly to them was \$1602.82.

Also, thanks to everyone who contributed to the Christmas Eve offering. The total amount of the offering was \$1720 and it was equally divided among Father Bill's/Mainspring, the UU Urban Ministry, and the UU Service Committee.

During this time when there are so many in need of the basic necessities of life—housing, food, and protection of basic rights—Old Ship is helping to create a better world and a more beloved community. Thanks to each of you for these donations and gifts!

ONE more cook is needed to fully staff the Father Bill's Cooking Teams for 2024!

With deep thanks to the seven new volunteers who have joined Father Bill's Cooking teams in recent months, we are happy to report that only one additional cook is needed for a Thursday night cooking team!

As of February 1st, the full program at Father Bill's/Mainspring's Yawkey Housing Resource Center in Quincy will be operational, meaning that 150 meals will be served every day of the year to overnight shelter guests and residents of the new longer term on-site housing. Each of our Father Bill's cooking teams provides four dinner meals per year to feed hungry adults and support the important work of the Housing Resource Center. The Thursday team that needs one additional cook provides a meal of shepherd's pie and salad on the 2nd Thursday of January, April, July and October What's involved: preparing a large steam tray of shepherd's pie (recipe, shopping list and large foil tray will be provided). You can make the dish in advance if that fits your schedule best, and bring the refrigerated or frozen tray to the shelter any day of that week that works for you (or a fellow team member can pick up your tray and deliver it). You are invited to help serve the meal (a very rewarding experience of chatting with shelter guests and staff) from 5-6pm on your team's Thursdays and that is optional. Will you help us provide these needed meals and support the important work at the Yawkey Housing Resource Center?

If you cannot volunteer yourself, would you please let your friends know about the need for an additional cook. Our cooking teams have always been comprised of caring persons from anywhere in our community. Thanks for your help in getting the word out about this need!


