#### **Board of Trustees' Updates**

The Board met for a monthly business meeting on Thursday, Feb. 1. Here some items discussed but not noted elsewhere in the newsletter;

**Trustees of Invested Funds** sent a proposal by email to merge the small endowment fund with the larger fund. Per the Old Ship bylaws this



change would require an amendment to the current bylaws. The TIF proposed that this item be added to the Annual Meeting agenda and voted on at the Annual Meeting in May. The inclusion of this proposed change was unanimously approved by the Board.

**Worship and Music Committee.** WAM needs a chairperson as well as additional members. See Karen Churchill for more information.

The Finance Committee recommended to finance the \$67,320 cost for the renewal of the lease at 14 Main St. from the following sources FY 23/24 Operating Budget - \$42,320 from existing surplus funds. FY 24/25 Operating Budget - \$25,000 from funds to be collected. The Board voted unanimously to approve this recommendation and ask for congregational approval at a Special Parish meeting set for 2/25. NOTE: Both articles related to lease renewal and sources for funding were approved by unanimous congregational votes on 2/25.

Community Space Team. The Team (Stuart Patterson, Ron Pollara, Elaine

Gomez, Laura Harbottle, John Sneath and Board Liaison Dennis Hogan) have had several meetings. The team has been making good progress on their due diligence and has come to a consensus on a tentative budget and basic space requirements. They are now arranging calls with a few architects/builders to get directional feedback on the project. Open meetings are set to begin in March.

Building and Grounds Committee A tree fell on the shed in a recent wind storm, damaging the roof and some of the siding. Our Sexton, Mark Curran, took care of repairs. Dave Petrie and Tom Willson are looking into having the plaque on the wall of the Meeting House engraved with the date of the end of Ken Read Brown's ministry. Church Mutual (our Insurance Company) did a risk assessment on the Meeting House in December, 2023 and there were several findings which will be attended to in the coming months.

The Nurturing Community Committee is also looking for members. The committee is especially in need of weekly "Greeters" to welcome people to service. There will be circle dinners in March with a theme to engage in a conversation about why people come to church. See chairperson Diane Elliott to sign up.

**Website Redesign**. Old Ship has signed a contract with KLS Designs for a redesign of our current website. Trish McAleer and Office Admin. Lisa Beck met in early Feb. with KLS to discuss a timeline and to give initial impressions on design and content. It is expected that the new website, pending Board approval, will be operational later this spring.

#### **Special Ministry Search Meeting**

The Board met for a second time on Thursday (2/15) in open session to discuss our ministry search for next year. Prior to meeting, Board members familiarized themselves with a summary of the types of transitional ministry described in the UUA Transitional Ministry Handbook. Click here for the link to Ministry Summary.

The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) recommends congregations engage in an interim ministry process prior to calling their next settled minister. The interim process is vital to help congregations review their practices, transitioning from past ministry, set their sights forward, and connects lay leadership and the congregation with resources.

Having considering both the past experience and future needs of our church, the Board unanimously agreed that hiring an experienced interim minister for next year is our best next step. We should note that last year's interim ministry unfortunately coincided with the turmoil and contentiousness of the Parish House sale which made interim work unfeasible. But although we did not engage in interim work, our previous interim minister provided valuable input on areas that needed our attention. Acting on this input, since last winter we have focused on healing and strengthening our church community by a number of activities. These have included our listening circles, parish conversations in the Meeting House, and community dinners.

In summary, we believe there is now greater readiness for interim work and plan to hire an interim minister through the UUA's search process this spring. The Board welcomes your feedback on this important topic. Please email any questions or comments to President@oldshipchurch.org.


#### SPRING (VERNAL) EQUINOX POETRY CIRCLE

March Special Plate Collection and March 10th Forum: Father Bill's/Mainspring — We are deeply aware of how many of our South Shore neighbors are in need of food, housing, and other necessities of daily life. Thus, we have decided to support Father Bill's/Mainspring this month. This organization is a "regional innovator and provider of prevention services, emergency shelter, permanent supportive housing, and supports to help those [they] serve on their path to stability and self-sufficiency." As you may know, we have provided 24 meals a year (through our six cooking teams) for Father Bill's shelter in Quincy for many years. On March 10, we are excited that Catie Reilly, Chief Development Officer for Father Bill's/Mainspring, will be with us for our service. Following the service, Catie will speak to us more generally about the work of the organization and how we can provide more support for it. Charles Coe has published 4 books of poetry and a novella. He's taught at numerous writing conferences, has been poet-in-residence at Wheaton College and the Chautauqua Institution, and is a professor of English and writing. He has also served as artist-in-residence for the City of Boston. For eighteen years he supervised the Organizational Support Grants program at the Massachusetts Cultural Council, where he heard the stories of many other artists and organizations. Mary Ford's fascinating memoir-turned-novel, "Boy at the Crossroads," about the early life of her husband Conley Ford, was published in 2021.
