Old Ship Church Labyrinth Meditation Walks Sunday, November 13th 5:00 PM

On October 16th the Fellowship Hall glowed with the beauty, positive energy, and light of yoga masters Moira Congdon and Trish Hart as they led some 35 participants in one of the most



spiritual and healing sessions of mind and body strengthening our beautiful Parish House has ever hosted. This two part evening event consisting of yoga and labyrinth walking, and drew practitioners and students from across our community and the state.

On mats, within a circle of candlelight, on our sacred Labyrinth, we joined

together for a 20 minute twilight session of yoga led by renown teacher and health and fitness ambassador Moira Congdon.

Moira's approach to yoga encourages each individual to see themselves as both the artist and masterpiece of their own lives. And that each day, hour, and moment is a new opportunity to care for oneself and the world around them. Her empowering ethic guides beginners and veterans alike - helping them to tap into the power within themselves, and guiding them into a lived practice based on the belief that together we are stronger.

Following this session the group took part an in-door candlelight labyrinth walk, accompanied by the ethereal music of yoga master, healer and musician Trish Hart. As a Stress Management & Resiliency Educator, Meditation & Mindfulness Instructor, Therapeutic Yoga Instructor and Sound Therapist, Trish uses her music literally as an instrument to help people find physical, emotional, and spiritual relief, transcendence, and joy. A host and organizer of spiritual retreats nationally (Sedona, etc.) and internationally - and throughout New England, Trish brought her talents as a gift to all of us - connecting us in

From way back Sherman Whipple designed posters and helped with public relations, and Carol Schuler baked and served the "coffee" part of Coffeehouse.

Old Ship Holiday Wreath Reservations: On Sale November 18, 19 & 20th

One of the oldest traditions at Old Ship is hanging the large holiday wreaths inside and outside the Meeting House. November Special Plate: Friends of the Homeless of the South

Shore: November's special plate will provide the funds for the annual holiday dinner for the families served by the Friends of the Homeless of the South Shore (FHSS). This dinner is returning this December for the first time since 2019; it was canceled in 2020 and 2021 due to COVID. As you may recall, we at Old Ship purchase and prepare the food for the dinner. Any funds remaining after purchase food and other dinner supplies will be given to FHSS to meet their needs in serving their clients.

Additional Opportunities to Support FHSS: At the time of this newsletter,

we are planning to host the annual dinner in December for the families served by the FHSS, but we do not have an exact date yet. We will be needing people to cook and to serve the dinner. When we did this before COVID, we cooked dishes in our homes and brought the food to Fellowship Hall. Some food was kept warm in crock pots. We will share the details in the weekly newsletters as we have them. Stay tuned! This is a really fun event and the families served by FHSS are grateful for this holiday celebration!

We are also planning to participate again in the holiday gift program from FHSS that provides gifts for families in their shelter, or families recently relocated to permanent homes. We will be providing gifts for 10 families, as we did last year. Again, stay tuned to the weekly newsletter for details. We should have the details shortly before Thanksgiving. Cooks needed for Father Bill's Cooking Teams: As you may know, Old Ship is part of an effort on the South Shore to provide meals to Father Bill's shelter in Quincy. We staff 6 cooking/serving teams that provide meals throughout the year. Each team is assigned 4 dates to cook; it is now possible to serve the meal on your assigned dates if you would like, but it is not required. You will be provided with a recipe and amounts of ingredients needed to make your team's entrée or the salad. If you cannot be present on the date of the meal, it is possible to cook beforehand and freeze your entree. The teams currently needing cooks provide meals on four Thursdays of the year, one each quarter. Lunches for the Anderson Veterans Home: We at Old Ship are part of a community wide interfaith effort to provide six lunches twice a week (Tuesday and Friday) to the Anderson Veterans Home on Fort Hill Street in Hingham. Task Force on Widening the Circle of Concern

White Supremacy Culture Within Unitarian Universalism: In 2017, the Unitarian

Universalist Association Board of Trustees established a Commission on Institutional Change. The commission was charged with conducting an audit of white privilege and the structure of power within Unitarian Universalism, and with analyzing structural racism and white supremacy culture within the UUA.



In 2020, the commission published Widening the

Circle of Concern, a report of its findings and recommendations about racism and white supremacy culture within Unitarian Universalism.

Last year, the Old Ship Board of Trustees appointed a special ad hoc task force to examine the report and to suggest how Old Ship might widen our welcome to all and encourage more diversity, inclusion, and equity.

The Task Force envisions this task as one for the entire congregation —this is our work as a faith community to transform ourselves, our community, and our world. As a first step in this work, members of the Task Force plan to meet with committees and other groups to discuss how we at Old Ship might work to dismantle forms of white supremacy culture that might be present in our community. As we digest the report, we are learning that because most of us live in the predominant culture, we do not always see the parts of the culture that support white supremacy.

We are excited about how this work could help to create a more beloved community at Old Ship, and we invite you to be part of this process! Davalene Cooper is chair of the task force.
