Board of Trustees December Update

November was a busy month at Old Ship. We on the Board were happy to see progress being made in all three of our focus areas. This month we practiced **strengthening our community bonds** in a number of areas with a number of activities only some of which we described here. Early this month, volunteers made and quickly sold holiday wreaths, while prep



began in earnest for our upcoming Merrie Market. Then on November 18, eighteen people attended our first community dinner at our space at 14 Main St. Also, on November 20, Old Shippers joined our fellow UUs in Quincy for a candlelight vigil on Transgender Day of Remembrance.

Also, this month preparations began for a Board coordinated dinner for families living in shelters through South Shore Friends of the Homeless which will take place on Dec. 12 at the Congregational Church.

Also, we started our congregation work on understanding White Supremacy Culture. On November 1, our Widening the Circle Task Force began a seminar on White Supremacy in Unitarian Universalism. This seminar was held on three consecutive Wednesdays and attended by twenty Old Shippers. It is expected more follow up work will be scheduled on this important topic in the new year.

Finally, this month the Board announced the creation of our initial **Community Space Team (CST)**. The six member team comprises Elaine Gomez, Laura Harbottle, Stuart Patterson, Ron Pollara, John Sneath and Dennis Hogan as the Board liaison. The CST will operate with Board oversight, hold open meetings and provide regular updates to the congregation. We expect this long term project to be multi-phased and require the talents and participation from a

variety of congregants To begin with, there will be a congregational meeting specifically on the community space planning early next year. Please stay tuned for more information on this exciting project!

What if you didn't know when your next meal would be?



Father Bill's/Mainspring provides the answer for at least 150 people each night by serving a hot nutritious dinner to adults who are experiencing homelessness.

Old Ship works to Serve Others by coordinating 6 teams of cooks who donate the Main Dish and the Salad for some of those meals. Each team provides food once a quarter (for a total of 4 meals each year by each team) on either Monday or Thursday evenings. Several of the cooking teams need new members as the number served has increased with opening of Father Bill's new site, the Yawkey Housing Resource Center in Quincy.

Will you help by making a Main Dish or a Salad? Current team members say it easy and fun and deeply meaningful to truly help others in such an important way.

You will get a recipe (ex. lasagna, chicken & rice casserole, shepherds' pie depending on the team) and instructions on what you need to buy (costs average \$50) for your donation to your team's dinner. You can join team members in helping to serve the meal in Quincy, can drop off your donation if that better fits your schedule or ask another team member to pick up and drop off your donation.

If you are not able to help, do you know someone who might like to? Please let your friends know about the need for additional cooks. Our cooking teams have always been comprised of caring persons from anywhere in our community.

What can you do to learn more about how Climate Change and White Supremacy Culture are

Connected? — We are asking the congregation to

engage in an "all church" read of a book that clearly connects these two issues that we have been focusing on as part of our social justice work. The book is *Climate Change is Racist: Race, Privilege and the Struggle for Climate Justice* by Jeremy Williams. The author argues that climate change "is structurally racist, disproportionately caused by majority White people in majority White countries, with the damage unleased overwhelmingly on people of colour." This is a short, 163 page book and our hope is that many of you will read it and then gather with us in small groups to talk about it around Martin Luther King's birthday in January. More details about those conversations will be in the January newsletter.

December Special Plate Collection: Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's Guest at Your Table Program — Guest at Your Table (GAYT) is UUSC's annual intergenerational program to raise support for and awareness about key human rights issues. Since UUSC works in more than 20 countries, with over 50 grassroots partners, there are thousands of individuals involved in and who benefit from the work that our members make possible. The program is an opportunity to celebrate grassroots partnership, support human rights, and learn about just four of these individuals—the "guests" in Guest at Your Table.

The theme of this year's GAYT program is Pursuing Liberation. The alarming rise of fascism, authoritarianism, and nationalism in the United States and in many places around the world is putting the lives of people, and the sustainability of the planet, in critical danger. These far-right forces have coopted the word "freedom" for their own purposes, but the concepts of liberation and freedom mean something very tangible to UUSC's grassroots partners in communities the world over. Whether they are fighting for the right to seek safety in Mexico and the United States, convincing the UN's International Court of Justice to address the human rights threatened by the climate crisis in the South Pacific, or replenishing the energy of human rights activists in eastern Europe by addressing burn-out, UUSC partners invite us into an expansive, regenerative space to pursue liberation.
