Worship

Sunday, December 1, 10:25am

This Sunday after Thanksgiving will be our annual "pulpit exchange" with First Parish in Cohasset. Ken Read-Brown will be preaching in Cohasset, and Rev. Bob McKetchnie will be preaching here at Old Ship.

Bob's sermon will be "Living the Sabbath: When Being Given A Time Out was A Good Thing." Bob writes: "Georgetown college philosophy professor, Norman Wirzba writes, 'The Sabbath once gave us an anchor in life, as well as a goal by which to judge our desires and striving.' Today's sermon will examine the benefits of recovering a Sabbath sensibility in our lives despite the fact that it makes no economic sense to do so."



Sunday, December 8, 10:25am

We are very pleased to welcome Rev. Mark Kiyimba back to our pulpit. Rev. Kiyimba was with us in the summer of 2014. He is a Unitarian Universalist minister and activist for LGBTQ rights in Uganda. He founded and leads the Unitarian Universalist Church of Kampala, Uganda; the church runs an orphanage and a school for children infected with HIV/AIDS and who have lost parents to the disease. He has been a vocal opponent of Uganda's Anti-Homosexuality Bill; in 2010, he organized a conference called "Standing on the Side of Love: Reimagining Valentine's Day" to protest the Bill. He has taken his opposition to the United States, seeking support for his mission. The National Education Association awarded him its 2012 Virginia Uribe Award for Creative Leadership in Human Rights.

Rev. Kiyimba's sermon will be "Unitarian Universalist Faith in 21st Century: A New Thinking For a New Millennium." Our Rev. Ken Read-Brown will host Rev. Kiyimba and lead our service.

Saturday evening, December 7, at 6:30 in the Parish House parlor, Rev. Kiyimba will show the film "God Loves Uganda", which the New York Times described as "A searing look at the role of American evangelical missionaries in the persecution of gay Africans." (*Refreshments will be served.*)

Sunday, December 15, 10:25am

In this Advent/Christmas/Hanukkah season of many stories, Ken's sermon will be "Inside the Story." How does the meaning of a story change when we remember that those inside the story didn't know how it would turn out? After all, something like our own lives.

Sunday December 22

Our annual pageant Sunday! Ken will share a UU re-telling of the story of the birth of Jesus. Participants in the pageant? Whomever wishes! If you're feeling like a shepherd... or like a star... or like an angel.... or like a wise one... costumes will be available when your time in the story arrives. Together we will create a memorable and beautiful tableau!

The service will of course include plenty of carols for all to sing.

Christmas Eve: Tuesday, December 24, 5pm

Old Ship's Christmas Eve service is a beloved tradition not only for us who regularly worship here, but for many others in the wider community. All are warmly welcomed to the stable we call our Old Ship Meeting House - for traditional carols, readings both traditional and not so traditional, beautiful music from Christopher and the choir, and a story from Ken.

The Meeting House fills early; wise ones plan to arrive before 4:30. Childcare for the very young will once again be kindly offered in the Parish House nursery by our good friends from Congregation Sha'aray Shalom.



Sunday, December 29 - service of shared readings in the Fellowship Hall

Our annual New Year's breakfast and service of shared readings will take place in our Fellowship Hall: Breakfast at 9:30; worship at 10:30. Everyone is invited to bring a reading to share, or just ears to listen.

Seasonal Vespers Services

On Wednesday evenings at 6:30 between Thanksgiving and Christmas, there will be vespers services in our gently lit Meeting House. Each service will include music from an Old Ship musician or two, readings from Old Ship readers, plenty of silence, and an opportunity to light a candle for someone or some hope or prayer - all coordinated and led by Ken Read-Brown. Each service will be about forty minutes long.

from the minister's desk

Musing

Here's the thing about holidays. They come no matter what else is going on in your life or in the larger world.

Thanksgiving? How do you celebrate if things in your life seem to be going awry? How do any of us celebrate this national feast when our democracy is under threat? And how have we ever celebrated a feast day that is, in part, a remembrance that is anything but evocative of thanks for the indigenous peoples of this land?

And what about Christmas? Are we meant to be joyful if our lives are anything but? Hopeful when hope is hard to find? Peaceful in the midst of turmoil and conflict? Of course it has ever been so. These and other holidays and holy days arrive on the calendar's schedule, which may or may not reflect our life's circumstances in any given year. Yet it seems to me that it is this fact itself which gives these holidays their power.

I'm of course not about to tell anyone how to feel in the midst of the holidays. I will report, though, that I've known folks who even as they were going through very difficult or traumatic life events expressed over and over again how thankful they were for gifts they were receiving in the midst of their struggle: the presence of friends, the casseroles, the notes, and so on. Challenge and gratitude intertwined, all at the same time. In Paul's letter to the Galatians he encouraged the community to give thanks in all circumstances - notice he did not say "for" all circumstances, but "in" all circumstances. Easy? Of course not. Possible? Maybe not always, but I've seen it. Perhaps you have too.

When it comes to the even more complicated festival of Christmas, I've observed that the way to spiritual health for many when the joy of Christmas just isn't possible for them, sometimes is to ignore the expectations of the culture and instead to find their own way through the season. This might mean seeking quiet times to reflect, perhaps going on some sort of retreat, as simple as a weekend with a friend who understands. Or, paradoxically, it might mean throwing themselves more wholeheartedly than ever into the carols and concerts and gatherings as a way of cutting through their sadness. Whatever the choice or strategy, the point is to listen to the promptings of our hearts rather than to the messages of the superficial culture all around us.

So... whatever is going on in your life this year as the season of Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukah, and Solstice is upon us, follow your heart, listen to inner promptings, seek a friend who understands. May you discover gratitude, perhaps joy, and I hope a measure of peace.

And if our lives are filled with blessings this season, may we reach out and offer a listening ear or helping hand to those whose personal calendar this year doesn't match the calendar on the wall.

"Phone and Photography Policy: We require all cell phones be placed on silent and that all participants refrain from being on them for the duration of the program. We discourage photography during the program. However, if you do take a few photos to share with your community, please respect the privacy of the CityReach staff and Open House guests. This means asking permission prior to taking a photo and being careful not to catch anyone in the background. While this is not an issue many of us consider serious in this age of smartphones and social media, it can be a source of anxiety and a considerable threat to safety for some individuals."

<u>Moving Forward:</u> Every community has poverty, even if it's not as visible as it is in downtown Boston. Look for ways to help in your own community.

<u>Tell Us How You Were Inspired:</u> We would love to hear from you after your City Reach experience. How did it impact your group? How were you inspired to help in your own community?

<u>Invite us to Visit:</u> *common cathedral* staff members are available to preach in your church and/or to lead forums about homelessness, and to encourage your congregation's involvement in our ministry. We will often bring one or two members of our community. We prefer that you make such preaching arrangements with us, rather than directly with CityReach staff."

Building and Grounds Committee

Thank you to Diane Jordan for taking the lead to get bids and choosing Pilgrim Paving to repave the Parish House Driveway. I'm sure everyone agrees it looks great; and thank you to the Board for redirecting funding to pay for this long-needed replacement.

Speaking of the new driveway pavement, the Committee wishes to protect it, especially the edge on the down-hill side (the usual exit to the street) that has a berm to funnel storm water and prevent erosion of the adjacent land. The Committee has requested that the Board agree that PARKING be PROHIBITED from that downhill side. There is plenty of parking along the side and back of the Parish House and we encourage all that are able, to use those other locations to park.

The Committee has struggled for several years with limited funds to decide what preventative maintenance and repairs to do in the Parish House, not knowing how long we would be in the building. Now that the property is no longer for sale, our focus shifts to a new phase of effort to

evaluate, plan and initiate necessary repairs and replacement. We welcome any members who are willing to assist and join the Committee as we undertake this next multi-year effort.

Finally, as he has decided to leave the Committee, I wish to thank Ron Pollara for his many years of dedicated service and hard work as co-chair. His knowledge, engineering skills and wise counsel have been invaluable to me.

Guest at Your Table Ends on Sunday, December 15! Bring your donations to our special plate collection that day!

-A 79-year-old human rights organization rooted in Unitarian Universalist values, UUSC advances human rights in the United States and around the globe through research, advocacy, and partnerships with small grassroots organizations. Guest at Your Table is the major fundraising program for congregations supporting our values through the many projects of UUSC.

-The theme for this year's program is "Women Leaders, Strong Communities." We will learn more about women leaders from UUSC partner organizations who are taking on some of today's greatest human rights challenges. Here are some examples of how your donations are used:

- \$25 helps women in Kiribati access clean water for their households by supporting the installation of new water tanks.
- \$50 supports a research project led by Muslim women about the surveillance of Muslim communities in the United States.
- \$75 advances drought recovery in Tanzania by providing livelihood support for one single mother, elderly woman, or woman living with disabilities.
- \$100 bolsters women's farming cooperatives in Nicaragua through supporting improved administrative systems and strategic planning.
- \$150 helps girls and women from Burma (Myanmar) attend leadership and peacebuilding trainings focused on bridging ethnic and religious divides within the country.
- \$300 supports legal assistance for vulnerable migrant populations applying for asylum at the U.S.-Mexico border, including mothers with young children and pregnant women.
- \$500 helps fund psychological support and improved security measures for Honduran women human rights defenders, who are facing threats, harassment, and surveillance.

-Following up on last month's commentary regarding the dramatic McKibben article on Banking support for the Fossil Fuel industry, I dug more deeply into the source reporting from the Rainforest Action Alliance and discovered MY BANKS WERE GETTING "D minus" RATINGS! I have now left Bank of America where I had both line of credit and all my banking. Last year my mortgage was with JP Morgan Chase!! Wow, it is also "D minus" rated. Now I also have to get rid of my Amazon Card (JP Morgan Chase). Two popular alternatives for credit card banks are Capitol One and Discovery. Now living in Linden Ponds - my banking is conveniently in house (and fossil free) with Hingham Institute for Savings.

-This was not the end of my enlightenment: I turned to look more deeply into my "Fossil Fuel Divested" retirement account. I discovered these D minus banks were in my portfolio - plus several more. I have since been exchanging important literature references on the "Climate Crisis" with my financial advisor because these banks are clearly supporting petroleum industry drilling in reserves that will push global warming to unsafe levels. This week will be my day of reckoning with this advisor!

-On an upside note; Hingham's Energy Action Committee is now embarked on the pathway to "Net Zero Emissions" for the entire town. Towns across Massachusetts and the South Shore are also actively working on this pathway as well.

-Last but not least the legislature has a number of exciting bills coming up for hearings with great potential to fund what we are hoping to do. For these efforts we give much thanks! Bless you all!
