### Join us once again this Fall to Restore, Renew, and Revive!

Please join us for our next event on

Dec 11: Mindfulness and Metta

Meditation. During this session certified

meditation leader Jen McConnell will lead the



labyrinth walk in Metta Meditation, a loving kindness meditation and Buddhist practice oriented to cultivate compassion for ourselves and others through directing loving, positive language, and goodwill. The word Metta is a Pali word often translated as loving kindness. This session, begins with a meditation that then segues into a labyrinth walk, leading us all to a kinder, more collaborative and peaceful place. The quiet bonds forged through this practice promotes self-compassion, decreases stress and anxiety, reduces physical pain, improves longevity and enhances social connections - nurturing stronger and more positive social relationships.

The Labyrinth as a sacred space and place allows each pilgrim to navigate many complex twists and turns. These turns are guided by their feet, but in reality they take place in space, time, minds, and lives. In the process each individual and the group as a whole become profoundly aware of what is under their feet (the Labyrinth, the earth...), and who and what is around you (other pilgrims, the lights, the building, the trees...).

For so many of us the Parish House Labyrinth is a place where we can walk, ponder our everyday lives, knowing in so many ways that we are alone and that so much of what is so important to us is out of our hands. That is, until someone reaches out their hand to hold yours as they pass by, or opens their arms to embrace you. Then we realize that we are not always alone. Together we are strong and capable. Our future is bright and together anything is possible.

## Looking for Old Ship Elves to Buy Presents for Families Living in Shelters!!

Old Ship has signed up to participate in the Friends of the Homeless of the South Shore's Christmas Gift Program. We have adopted 9 families for the holidays, consisting of 7 fathers, 10 mothers/grandmothers, 5 teenagers, 18 children, and 2 infants. These families are either currently living in shelters or have just moved into more



permanent housing. This is our opportunity to make the holidays more special for those in need, and perhaps, even more special for those of us who participate! We certainly had a great time doing this last year!

Here are the details of the program. Each Old Shipper who participates will adopt one or more members of each family we have adopted. The program

anticipates that we will purchase 3 gifts for each child or parent, with the total costs of the gifts being about \$60 -- \$80 per person. (If this is more than you are able to spend, consider sharing one of the names with another person—the program is trying to make sure each person receives an equal set of gifts.) You will receive information by email about your person, including their name, age, sex, clothing size, shoe size, and suggestions for possible gifts. You then purchase the gifts, wrap them, put the person's names on the gift, and bring them to the Parish House Parlor on Sunday, December 11. You may also drop the gifts off at the Parish House from December 5-9 during normal office hours. If none of those options work, contact Davalene Cooper and she will make arrangements to get your gifts!

How do you adopt a person? We are assigning names via email since that worked so well last year. To participate, email <a href="Davalene Cooper">Davalene Cooper</a> and tell her the number of names you would like and any preferences you have (age, sex, etc.). We will honor your requests and preferences to the extent possible. Davalene will email you the information about your family member(s). And remember, we will need to have your gifts no later than Sunday, December 11. Questions? Email or call <a href="Davalene">Davalene</a>, 781-749-0790. Erin Splaine, our Interim Minister, to find ways to help the congregation make the necessary changes between settled ministries, to correct problems and prepare the way for the next minister. This is a time of reflection, and Listening Circles seem like the best way for us to begin our work. These Listening Circles are the first step towards sharing our personal experiences at Old Ship and how affected we have been by the many changes in these past few years. We hope you all will have the

opportunity to share personal thoughts, listen to each other with love, compassion and honesty. This work will be about helping all of us look both back at our history and forward to where and who we want to be as Unitarian Universalists and members of First Parish, Hingham.

We are planning our first Listening Circles to be held during the months of December and January. There will be multiple opportunities for you to choose a day and time that works best for you. Meetings will be in person or on Zoom. There will be no more than 8 people per group. The purpose of the listening circle is to be free to talk uninterrupted in a safe space. A circle keeper will ask a question and pass a talking piece to the person next to them. That person will respond to the question and pass the talking piece to the next person. This process will continue in a circle until everyone has been able to speak what is on their mind or in their hearts. One person talks, while other people listen. Each circle will last approximately 0ne and a half hours



Hingham Food Pantry: We are again collecting food donations for the Hingham Food Pantry. # Task Force on Widening the Circle of Concern

White Supremacy Culture Within Unitarian Universalism: In 2017, the Unitarian Universalist Association Board of Trustees established a Commission on Institutional Change. The commission was charged with conducting an audit of white privilege and the



structure of power within Unitarian Universalism, and with analyzing structural racism and white supremacy culture within the UUA.

In 2020, the commission published Widening the Circle of Concern, a report of its findings and recommendations about racism and white supremacy culture within Unitarian Universalism.

Last year, the Old Ship Board of Trustees appointed a special ad hoc task force to examine the report and to suggest how Old Ship might widen our welcome to all and encourage more diversity, inclusion, and equity.

The Task Force envisions this task as one for the entire congregation —this is our work as a faith community to transform ourselves, our community, and our world. As a first step in this work, members of the Task Force plan to meet with committees and other groups to discuss how we at Old Ship might work to dismantle forms of white supremacy culture that might be present in our community. As we digest the report, we are learning that because most of us live in the predominant culture, we do not always see the parts of the culture that support white supremacy.

We are excited about how this work could help to create a more beloved community at Old Ship, and we invite you to be part of this process! Davalene Cooper is chair of the task force. Members are Ralph Brown, Fan Leonard, Ellie Handleman, Laura Harbottle, Eva Marx, and Patti Smith.
