Sunday, May 4

Following the service we will bring our coffee and refreshments to our Annual Meeting, during which we will discuss and vote on the budget for the upcoming year, on our revised new bylaws, and other matters. All morning we will also be celebrating the 10th anniversary of marriage equality in Massachusetts, recognizing the landmark court ruling that designated the constitutional right of same-sex marriage in Massachusetts and the day marriage licenses were first issued on May 16, 2004. There are bigger problems and, sad to say, suffering on much larger scales in the world than even the tragedy and terror of last year's Boston Marathon bombings. And in the sweep of human history, not to mention geologic and cosmic history, a footrace and a local Monday holiday are modest events. But though all this may be relatively small in one way of measuring, the lessons we can draw from all that has transpired from last year to this - lessons in kindness and compassion, lessons in resilience, lessons having to do with the nature of community - are huge and are surely good things. Oh that we could transplant to troubled parts of the world, and to the earth in its wholeness, the spirit of care, kindness, community, and resilience that seemed to freshly grow during this past year in Boston.

Gary Snyder, one of the two poets we are studying in this spring's poetry class, encourages us in this direction with his poignant and beautiful "For the Children" first published over forty years ago, but still resonating today:

The rising hills, the slopes, of statistics lie before us. the steep climb of everything, going up, up, as we all go down.

In the next century
or the one beyond that,
they say,
are valleys, pastures,
we can meet there in peace
if we make it.
To climb these coming crests
one word to you, to
you and your children:
stay together
learn the flowers
go light

Plymouth Detention Center Vigil

The next vigil outside the Plymouth Correctional Facility, which holds the detention center, will take place on Saturday, May 10, at 10:30am. This vigil is sponsored by the Brewster UU Alliance for Immigration Justice.

Plymouth Rock July 4th Vigil

A vigil will be held on July 4th in the center of Plymouth with the goal of calling attention to the immigration issues that continue to remain unresolved in this country. Specific time and exact place have not yet been decided upon. please stay tuned.

Plymouth Detention Center Phone Project

Seven people, mostly from the Brewster UU, have formed a group that will make free phone calls available to the detainees inside the detention center in Plymouth. Each day there will be a two hour time slot where detainees can call a free number which has been already set up within the prison through the CIVIC organization (endisolation.org) It is hoped that not only will this phone project reduce the isolation detainees experience during their detention which is often undetermined in length, but it also will make free phone calls available to them. Phone calls from

prisons are extremely expensive and usually not affordable to inmates. The phone project also hopes to provide access to family members of detainees via three-way phone connections established via this free phone number. If you are interested in joining us in this effort and have two hours per week available to receive calls, please call Ursula Stone at 781-826-2031. I will be glad to tell you more about this project and will be able to get you hooked up to this system. We are especially looking for people who speak Spanish.

- Food: Would you be willing to prepare a casserole to be given to someone
 who could use a little extra help following a hospitalization or in the midst of
 illness or treatments?
- Companionship: Would you be willing to spend a few hours now and then with an Old Ship member when the primary caregiver in their household needs to be away from the home for a short while?

Brian McPhillips' Tall Ship Adventure: May 4 forum

Brian, a member of Old Ship and a family physician, took a three month break from his practice in early 2013 to serve as medical officer and trainee aboard the three-masted Tall Ship, Picton Castle. On Sunday, May 4, at noon in the Parish House parlor, he will show slides and talk of his adventures on this 180 foot barque, which sails out of Lunenburg, Nova Scotia. The ship travels around the world on a mission to provide trainees with the adventure of sailing the open ocean and preserve traditional seamanship skills.


